PSWA into the Future

The vision of the Pharmaceutical Society of Western Australia is to be a major facilitator for pharmacy research and practice development in Western Australia. The Pharmaceutical Society of Western Australia (PSWA) is a state based pharmacy organisation with nearly 3,000 pharmacist members. Our members are from all areas of pharmacy including; community pharmacy owners, employee pharmacists, and hospital pharmacists. Currently membership to the PSWA is free to eligible pharmacists.

The J M O'Hara Research Fund

The J M O'Hara Research Fund was established in 1976 in recognition of John Michael O'Hara, a highly respected Western Australian pharmacist. The J M O'Hara Research Fund provides assistance to PSWA's members by providing grants for WA based research in pharmaceutical sciences and pharmacy practice, encouraging and promoting studies designed to improve the practice of pharmacy.

Our vision is to establish an ongoing substantial funding source to provide significant grants for larger scale, cutting edge research projects in WA, which will have positive benefits for the pharmacy industry and improve health outcomes for all Western Australians.

The J M O'Hara Research Fund aims to be a major player in health research in WA and be recognised by Government and the wider health industry as making an important contribution to community health and future health services delivery.

The Pharmacy 100 Club

To achieve this vision, PSWA are bringing together a core group of at least 100 pharmacists to commit to a tax-deductible donation to the J M O'Hara Research Fund of \$5,000 over five years to the J M O'Hara Research Fund. Our Recent Research Funding

Determination of the prevalence and factors influencing the provision of enhanced and extended professional services by pharmacists in Western Australian

Dr Petra Czarniak of the School of Pharmacy, Curtin University was granted funding of \$46,858 in 2016. The research represents a unique opportunity to determine the extent of enhanced and extended services provided by pharmacies in WA, which contribute to improved community health and cost savings to the government. Many of these services are provided free of charge by pharmacy in an environment where pharmacies may no longer be able to absorb the costs of these important services. The results of this research will enable strategies to be developed to increase the uptake of and remuneration of professional services.

Enhancing primary care processes in community pharmacy

Assistant Professor Liza Seubert from the University of Western Australia was the recipient of the 2015 J M O'Hara Research Fund Grant. The research looks at the interaction between customers and staff in the community pharmacy environment. With a renewed focus on developing new professional services through community pharmacy the interim research outcomes provided a tangible focus on positively changing customer behaviour and enhancing consumer trust within the community pharmacies environment.

Medications for mental health

Assistant Professor Deena Ashoorian researched the new paradigms for the partnership management of medications for mental health consumers in the community. This important research, which involved the development, validation and trial of a novel side effect tool for psychotropic medications, will be of benefit to clinicians, pharmacists and mental health consumers. My Medicines and Me Questionnaire (M3Q) are resources developed that are currently being used in a range of clinical settings worldwide, including translated versions. In addition, the Health Department of WA has recognised its value in bridging the communication gap and have agreed to co-badge and distribute the M3Q in mental health clinics.
